About the island:

Playa Blanca:

Over the past few years Playa Blanca, originally a small fishing village has been transformed into one of the islands main tourist areas.

Playa Blanca, at the southern-most tip of Lanzarote, is fast becoming one of the island's finest tourist areas. Almost always basked in warm sunshine and with the sea a constant calm, clear blue, Playa Blanca is a holidaymaker's paradise. There are superb views of the mountains and the islands of Lobos and Fuerteventura across the water.

If it's lazy days in the sun you are looking for, this is the ideal place.

Playa Blanca's beaches are small but perfectly formed and benefit from excellent nearby amenities such as the shops, bars and restaurants. Luxurious apartment complexes and hotels offer visitors first-class, modern accommodation for their holiday. Quieter than the other resorts, Playa Blanca is fantastic for families who want to spend the day around their pool or at the beach and their nights enjoying fine food at one of many international restaurants. Most hotels and apartments offer in-house entertainment for kids and adults alike so there is no shortage of fun.

From the harbour at Playa Blanca, ferries cross several times a day to Fuerteventura. It is possible to go to the island as a foot passenger or with a car and the 45-minute crossing is good fun in itself as you can sit on the open-air terrace and enjoy the ocean.

One of the most beautiful beaches on the island (and some people say in all of Spain) is in close proximity to Playa Blanca. Payagayo beach is a must-see place for anyone staying in Playa Blanca, consisting of several small coves and accessible via a dirt track after paying the admittance fee of €3 per car.

La Goleta:

La Goleta is a residential area rather than a holiday resort and many of the residents are our friends so we ask that you please give the other inhabitants due consideration.

Climate:

Lanzarote enjoys a near perfect climate, not getting too hot in summer, or too cool in winter. You should beware of the power of the sun's rays, which can be masked by the breeze that is often present on the island. Please make sure you use adequate protection to get the best enjoyment from your holiday.

Water:

Water is the island's most precious commodity. Please use it sparingly. The tap water in Lanzarote does not carry any germs but since all water is reclaimed from the sea by the very expensive process of desalination, it has a very high mineral content and can cause stomach upsets as you will not be used to it. Whilst tap water is fine for cleaning teeth etc., you are advised to drink only bottled water. Bottled water is available from all supermarkets and the various brands are quite widely varying in price. Our experience shows very little in taste between the brands so there is little point in buying the most expensive brands. The water in the square bottles such as Agua De La Palma or Sierra Cazokla is far easier to manage in the fridge. Chafariz is available for around €1 for a 5-litre bottle and the Marcial Supermercado offers the SPAR own brand which is similarly priced.

Because of the scarcity of water, you are requested to use it very sparingly – do not leave the tap running whilst brushing your teeth, please use a glass. The hot water tank is very small and takes quite a while to heat up so please shower rather than bathing if you want to remain friends with the rest of your holiday party! We even switch the shower off between soapings and rinses to ensure that everyone has some hot water.

Mosquitoes:

At certain times of the year, mosquitoes are present on Lanzarote and the main problem is that you usually don't notice them until you are bitten. Mosquito bites can be very uncomfortable. We recommend the use of a plug-in repellent.

Currency:

Since the Canary Islands are Spanish owned, the local currency is the Euro although you will still find some shops marking items up in Pesetas. The Euro is worth approximately 70 pence or a Pound 1.42 Euros.

Customs Allowances:

Since 1992 the Canary Islands have been in the E.U. However there is still a duty free allowance that you cannot exceed when going back to the U.K.

Travellers over 17 years:

200 cigarettes or 50 cigars or 250g smoking tobacco; 1L spirits over 22% or 2L spirits under 22%, 2L sparkling wine and 2L of any other wine. £145 worth of other goods including gifts and souvenirs. 60mL perfume, 250mL eau de toilette.

Persons up to 15 years:

500g coffee or 250g coffee powder and 100g tea; 50ml perfume 25ml eau de toilette.

Supermarkets and shops:

The Canary Islands are a shopping paradise because there is no joy-cooling customs barrier. Shopping therefore is a pleasure as never before. Not even the tax-free shops at the airports can compete with prices in the Canaries. Liqueurs, tobacco, cameras and film cameras, tape recorders, transistor radios, watches, everything is cheaper than in their countries of origin. From Nigerian crocodile skin to ivory carved on the banks of the Ganges or real Chinese silk, the most curious, rarest objects can be found.

There are several perfumeries in Playa Blanca, Puerto del Carmen and Arrecife all offering excellent bargains – these shops are much cheaper than the airport duty free shops.

There is a huge market in Teguise every Sunday morning where you will find many interesting craft items for sale and some very good quality lace work. You will also find plenty of fake Rolex and Gucci watches at bargain prices!

- The closest shops are at Playa Flamingo, about 2.5km on the way to Playa Blanca. Leave La Goleta and turn right at the fifth roundabout. Playa Flamingo is about 500m down this road, past the RIU apartments and Lanzasur Club. There are a couple of supermarkets and several bars and restaurants in Playa Flamingo.
- The best supermarkets are in Playa Blanca. Follow the dual carriageway to the junction with LZ-2 and turn right at the petrol station. Go straight ahead at the next roundabout and take the first road on the right. You will see the sign for the Marcial Supermercado on your left. This supermarket has a small in-store bakery and you can get some excellent fresh bread. Park wherever you can (if you take the next right - you have to turn right here - there is a small car park on the left).
- There is a good range of shops, bars etc. in the pedestrian precinct just below the car park and also along the Playa Blanca promenade.
- Beware that prices vary greatly and you can pay twice as much for a bottle of wine at the more local shops.

Driving:

- Try to drive on the right – that's what most other people will be doing!
- If you want more than a glass of wine, get a taxi. They are cheap and easy to get – the local number is under useful numbers toward the end of

this manual. The drink drive laws in Spain are stricter than in the UK and you won't get much of a tan in jail!

- Driving is easy in Lanzarote. Most people are well behaved and most rental cars aren't powerful enough for you to get in to trouble anyway. Pretty much anything goes but look out for other hire cars, especially on Thursdays because that's when the British will have just arrived and haven't yet got used to driving on the right!
- Speed limits are clearly indicated, as are no 'overtaking zones'. The police impose heavy fines for breaking the motoring laws, which you will be expected to pay on the spot in cash.
- Remember that you give way to the left at roundabouts. Beware of the roundabouts both ends of Yaiza. For some reason, the main road, LZ-2 is not bisected by the roundabouts, but just touches the edge. If you are going towards Playa Blanca, you just go dead straight but you need to make sure nothing is approaching from the left first. When travelling towards Tias and Arrecife, you have the entire roundabout to navigate.
- If you park beside the villa, be careful when reversing out so as not to drive in to the wall – it is solid volcanic rock and does not yield to car bumpers.
- Petrol is readily available on the island but not all the petrol stations are 24 hour so don't let your tank get too low – especially on a Sunday.
- Don't park in any parking bay that is marked in yellow – this denotes that the bay is reserved for emergency services.

Wines:

There are many fine wines to choose from. Wines from Lanzarote are particularly good. The Torres range are very good value, Sangredetoro, Gran Sangredetoro, Coronas and Grand Coronas being of excellent quality.

Restaurants:

There are many good restaurants on the island. The promenade at Playa Blanca plays host to many, ranging from Pizzerias to good quality gourmet foods. Many have an Italian theme, along with international cuisine. It should be noted that the promenade at Playa Blanca is a tourist area and the restaurants in this area tend to cater for such clientele.

We are fortunate to have some good restaurants within very easy walking distance. Literally at the bottom of the road, opposite the entrance to Faro Park:

- **El Portico** – Very good Italian restaurant with a limited menu and fabulous freshly made pizzas. If you fancy something that isn't on the menu, they will usually accommodate you. Take-away service.
- **Lighthouse Cafe / The Snug** – good English cuisine, very friendly Take-away service.
- **Chinese** – Speaks for itself. Good food, take-away service.

A short walk further, toward the Natura Palace Hotel (5-10 minutes stroll)

- **Argentina** – First class Argentinian serving awesome steaks.
- **Pintxos y Tapas** – next door to above – first class Spanish cuisine, great service and very reasonable prices

In the same development, there is a Pizzeria, a fish restaurant and down the steps toward the beach, an international cuisine bar / restaurant which has very good live entertainment most evenings..

The best restaurants are often to be found further inland:

- **La Bocaina.** Playa Blanca, on the right, just past the petrol station, travelling toward Playa Blanca. First class Cuisine. Closed on Mondays. 928 518 388.
- **La Cocina de Colacho,** Marina Rubicon – keep going on the main road, past the entrance to the marina and it is the first road on the right. Excellent Spanish and international dishes. Close on Mondays.
- **Manos.** Marina Rubicon. First class food – try the fillet steak with chestnut sauce!
- **La Trattoria.** Excellent Italian food – make sure you book on a Friday, Saturday or Sunday unless there are just 2 of you to avoid disappointment.
- **La Era.** Yaiza, behind the Town Hall. Tel. 928 83 00 16. Open all week from 1.00pm till 11.00pm. Booking advised. <http://www.la-era.com>. This restaurant in the lovely little village of Yaiza, is set in a 300-year-old farmhouse with gardens, courtyards and outbuildings lovingly restored by Cesar Manrique into a fascinating and beautiful place to eat and drink. La Era serves authentic Canarian cuisine as well as International dishes.
- **Restaurante La Pappardella.** Puerto Calero, (worth a visit just to see the yachts in the marina) excellent Italian restaurant, run by Italians.
- **Restaurante El Campo.** Yaiza, excellent Canarian and International cuisine. 928 830 344.

- **Restaurante Playa Quemada.** Playa Quemada. We would recommend this as one of the best restaurants we have found on the island so far. Just after Yaiza, there is a right turn that takes you down to Playa Quemada. Don't wear your high heels as the car park leaves a little to be desired. Fabulous food and always excellent fresh fish available. Booking advised. 928 173 707

There are also many good restaurants in the old port at Puerto del Carmen, notably, **Puerto Viejo**, 928 51 52 65 and **La Casa Roja** (part of the same group as Reasaurante Playa Quemada) 928 515 866. Puerto del Carmen is also the busiest tourist area on the island.

The new Rubicon Marina (in to Playa Blanca, turn left past Playa Dorada and follow the signs) is a very up and coming place with new bars and restaurants opening all the time. Notably, **Manos** and **Casa Roja**.

You can call any of the numbers here from a UK mobile telephone without the need for any dialling codes.

Canarian Cuisine:

Typical Canarian Cuisine includes many dishes prepared with fish caught in large amounts along the coast. Fish is served with the famous **papas arrugadas**, potatoes boiled in salt water, and a hot sauce called **mojo**.

Traditional dishes are watercress stew, the popular **sancocho canario**, made with salted fish and **mojo**, rabbit in **salmorejo**, a sauce consisting of water, vinegar, olive oil, salt and pepper, sweet black pudding, etc. Banana and tomato, the main source of wealth of the islands, also occupy an important place in Canary cooking as do avocado pear and papaya fruit as well as **gofio**, a roasted mixture of wheat, maize or barley, which is eaten with certain dishes of the country instead of bread. Among the sweets, especially outstanding are **tirrijalas**, **bienmesabes**, **frangollo**, **bizcochos lustrados**, **turrones de melaza** or **gofio** and pastry. Among the drinks produced in the islands, there are especially rum, rum-cum-honey, malmsey wine and the local wines produced on Lanzarote.

About Casa Bocayna:

Swimming Pool:

The pool is clearly a major advantage of Casa Bocayna. In order to achieve maximum enjoyment of this feature, there are a few guidelines that you would be wise to adhere to:

- Use of the pool is entirely at your own risk and children should be supervised at all times. There is no shallow end.
- ***The pool cover should be on the pool at all times when not in use. The cover not only protects from dirt and dust but also magnifies the sun's energy throughout the day and its reflective underside maintains the heat in the water during the night. The cover typically raises the water temperature by up to 10°C. The pool is electrically heated in winter to enable all year round enjoyment.***
- **Lanzarote can be very windy at times. In windy conditions, two people should replace the cover with one person each side of the pool pulling the cover rather than the drawstring and keeping the cover in contact with the water to prevent the wind getting under the cover.**
- The cover should be removed from the pool by slowly rotating the roller **clockwise** whilst ensuring that the cover winds squarely on to the roller.
- The cover should be installed on the pool by pulling the drawstring slowly from the centre of the pool above the roman steps.
- Please do not let children cover or uncover the pool.
- The only person who was able to walk on the pool cover is sadly no longer with us, although most of us celebrate his birthday every year in late December.
- Please do not sit on the cover roller.
- Please do not use any glasses in or around the pool. Plastic glasses are provided for use on the pool terrace. There is only one way to find broken glass in a swimming pool – with your feet!
- The marble floor tiles in the villa are very slippery when stepped on with wet feet or when the floor has been left wet by others – take care to dry off properly when going from the pool in to the villa.
- The pool is serviced every week including cleaning and maintenance of the correct chemical balance.
- If you are wearing sun tan oil, please take a brief shower prior to using the pool as the oil clogs the filters and dilutes the purifying chemicals.

Sunbeds:

- There are four sunbeds provided around the pool terrace for your enjoyment. The cushions are also provided for your comfort but you would be well advised to remove the cushions at night as there often tends to be a heavy dew at night and they will be quite wet by the morning. All exterior cushions may be kept in the store room overnight.
- For your own comfort, and that of subsequent guests, please put a towel on the cushion before using the sunbed in order to protect it from suntan lotion.
- Please ensure the velcro retainer is fastened under the sunbed to protect the cushion from being blown in to the pool or further afield.

Doors and Windows:

- Lanzarote can often be quite windy and for this reason, hooks have been fitted to all the windows and external doors to prevent them from slamming which could cause injury and/or damage. Please use them, you may not see the need if just a single window is open but when another window or door is opened, you may experience a problem.

Washing Machine:

- The washing machine is in the utility room, and is installed for your use. Please provide your own detergent and fabric softener – there will probably be some left by the previous occupant so if you buy a little, the next people will also have enough for a day or two.
- Program 5 is a short program that is adequate for freshening up holiday clothes. Don't forget to set the temperature via the control on the front of the machine.
- There is a drying frame in the utility room and since it is usually sunny and often windy too, it won't take long to dry your clothes. Be sure to use pegs or you will have to take the ferry to Fuerteventura to get your clothes back!
- The sun terrace or open end of the dining area will usually be the best place for positioning the drying frame.

TV & Video:

- The TV will only pick up CNN and numerous Spanish and German programmes. The TV should be set to AV to tune to Video 1 at all times.

DVD Player:

- The TV should be set to TV/AV tuned to Video 1.
- When the DVD is switched on via the remote control handset or the power switch, the TV will automatically connect to the DVD.

Hi Fi:

- There are three English radio stations on Lanzarote
- **Buzz FM.** 88.6 Mhz. The first preset channel is tuned to this station.
- **Holiday FM.** 105.5 Mhz. The first preset channel is tuned to this station.
- **Power FM.** North of the island 91.5Mhz, South of the island **91.7Mhz**
- Don't forget to take a selection of your favourite CDs.

Outside Lights:

There are five switches that control the outside lights.

- One by the front door for the porch
- One to the right of the French doors in the lounge for the terrace.
- Two by the kitchen door for the dining area and the dining table.

Microwave:

The microwave is probably more basic than the one you are used to at home. The instructions are entirely in Spanish. There are four heat settings, going clockwise to Alto, which is the highest. The settings after Alto are for the grill, which you will probably not need to use. When you close the door, the oven starts again at whatever setting you were using so if you have finished with it, please switch off by turning the timer back to zero.

Oven & Hob

The hob is ceramic and very easy to keep clean. It is not so easy to see if an element is still hot so please be careful and remember to switch off after use. The oven takes a while to heat up but is reasonably efficient. It has a temperature control and a control to choose which elements to use. The settings that use the upper elements only, also operate the motor for the spit.

We never use the spit but the upper element can be useful for browning or finishing off.

Dishwasher:

The dishwasher is a useful edition although it is rather small and if you can get 6 place settings, saucepans and utensils in it, please take a photograph so we can see how it's done! In all seriousness, it's great for taking care of lunch things and glasses since most people are going to go out for their evening meal. Again, you need to provide your own powder/tablets. In most cases, there will be some left by a previous occupant so if you buy a little, the next people will also have enough for a day or two.

Power:

The electricity supply in Lanzarote is occasionally susceptible to interruption but not usually for prolonged periods. In the case of a loss of power, there is a torch provided – in the third drawer down in the kitchen. Spare batteries are provided in the kitchen drawer. There are also candles in the cupboard above the fridge freezer. If you need to use candles, please use a saucer with a little of water in for the sake of safety.

Water (again):

As previously stated, water is scarce on Lanzarote. All the taps in the villa have a half-way setting. You can feel resistance at the half-way when turning the tap on. The half-way setting gives ample power for a shower whilst being economical with the water. The hot water tank holds 100 litres and takes 4 hours to heat up from cold so please remember other members of your party when taking a shower or using hot water for other purposes.

Books:

There is a selection of books in the sideboard in the hall. If you get to the end of your stay and find you haven't finished a book you found in the villa, we invite you to take it home with you. Likewise, if you bring one with you and you do finish it, why not leave it for others to enjoy?

Smoking:

We respectfully ask that you do not smoke anywhere inside the villa please.

Safe:

There is a safe in the bathroom in the master suite for your use. It is large enough to accommodate all your valuables as well as your passport, tickets, credit cards, cash, cameras etc. **The key is in the door, please ensure you leave it there when you return home. There will be a charge of €50 for the replacement of a lost safe key.**

Picon:

The black gravel-like substance that covers the garden area is crushed volcanic rock and is called *picon*. It has a quality that keeps the sun's rays from drying the earth beneath and it collects and transfers the dew that occurs at night in to the earth. It also gets stuck in the soles of trainer shoes and then scratches the marble tiles of the villa floor so please do not walk on it and then transfer it in to the villa.

Refuse Collection:

Refuse is collected centrally from large bins placed at the side of many roads. Although technically, you can use any bin, there are bins designated for the use of La Goleta residents located on the right side of the entrance to Residencia La Goleta. There are four white doors and the bins are inside this enclosure.

The Garden:

The garden was planted in January 2005. The watering system is computerised to deliver the right amount of water to each plant without wasting a drop. The water comes on very early in the morning to avoid loss by evaporation and so as not to interfere with guests needing showers etc. Chris (128 Faro Park) is the La Goleta gardening guru who planted it all and manages the garden for us. Please do not tamper with the watering system and keep children from touching it.

Health Matters:

There is a very good English speaking doctor in Playa Flamingo next door to the car rental shop. The telephone number is: 928 519039. There are numerous pharmacies around Lanzarote, the nearest being in Playa Blanca 920 517614. There are many more medicines available “over the counter” in Spain than in the UK, for example strong pain killers and antibiotics. The pharmacists usually speak English and are generally very helpful.

The European Economic Area (EEA) consists of the 15 member states of the European Community plus Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway. If you or any of your dependants are suddenly taken ill or have an accident during a visit to any of these countries, free or reduced-cost emergency treatment is available – in most cases on production of a valid European Health Insurance Card (EHIC). Only state-provided emergency treatment is covered, and you will receive treatment on the same terms as nationals of the country you are visiting. Private treatment is generally not covered, and state-provided treatment may not cover all of the things that you would expect to receive free of charge from the NHS.

Further details about who is eligible for and how to apply for a European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) can be found on the website:
